RAILWAY RATES UNCHANGED. With Increased Rates Travel Is Very Heavy

-Slight Hopes Of Settlement. MONTREAL, March 7. The week opens with the railway rate war situation unchanged. The Canadian Pacific offic als had no new move to announce this morning and the Grand Trunk people are not likely to do anything unless action is invited by some development on the part of the enemy. All concerned are quite frank in admitting the obscurity of the end of it all. It is conceded on all hands that the difficulty is as insoluble as it was months ago. The C.P.R. will not talk to tht American roads until they agree to restore former tariffs, allowing them their differentials, while the American roads and Grand Trunk will confer at any time an place but refuse to restore the differential in the meantime. Thus the matter stands
