Henry Miller's Genuine Success In "The Master."

STRONG LESSON TO THE ACTOR.

It Proves That His Forte Lies In Delinestion of Character Old Men - Daughter of the Kendals to Sing In Vaudeville. Comment on "Stellar Alliances."

Henry Miller appears to have scored a genuine success in "The Muster," the new play by G. Stuart Ogilvie, which is the current attraction at the Garden theater. Then he was an old man of peculiar temperament and ideas, and he was thereby enabled to get away from the stereotyped and sometimes rather mushy speeches which playwrights will persist in putting into the mouth of the fellow who is doomed to marry the beroine or at any rate to be engaged to ber before the final fall of the curtain.

If Mr. Miller is wise, he will profit by this double lesson, but as leading men like to play "lover parts," and as Mr. Miller is now more than a leading man, it is just possible that in spite of everything he may give the "old men" the go by and foolishly continue to confine his attention to "heroes."
