





This coal capacity is low compared with the cruising type of warship, but as the Terror is not designed to leave the coast, large bunker room is not necessary.

The engines of the Terror, while not of the latest type, are efficient. They are of the inclined compound type and have always worked with reasonable smoothness. On her turrets the armor is 11.5 inches. The side armor is 7 inches thick.

These turrets of the Terror are virtually Dominion Line Steamships impregnable. Both are alike and each is formed of five harveyized nickel steel plates. 
