The Irish Local Government Bill Has Pass-Currency Question to the Imperial Gov-

LONDON, March 22 .- Replying in the house of commons to questions on the subject, the financial secretary of the treasury, R. W. Hanbury, said the delay in the establishment of a parcel post between Great Britain and the United States was due to the reluctance of the authorities at . Washington to inaugurate such a service. Negotiations had been proceeding since 1885 and there were reasons to hope that an arrangement would shortly be reached. Mr. Hanbury said a conference on postal rates within the British empire would meet in June next.
