Kingston is the chief transhipping point between the northwest and the seaboard for Canadian produce, and this port is to Canada what Buffalo is to the United The harbor contains several shallow reefs on which heavily laden boats often grounded. To release these it was necessary to send out floating elevators, but now that stationary elevators have been supplied steamers cannot be lightened until they reach the docks, hence the necessity of a clear deep channel. With the increase in number of deep draught boats coming into ports, which will follow from the greater elevator accommodation, the importance of a sufficiently deep waterway will become more apparent.
