

Bis Humane Gun Theory—Bis First Guns Destroyed-Gen. Butler Was the First Purchaser - & Very Readable Article. Chicago Tribune.

Dr. Richard Jordan Gatling, the inventor of the famous engine of death which bears his name and which forms part of the life-destroying equipment or else walk slowly home; and what is the or every army and navy of the world, is actively engaged in Cleveland in the construction of a monstrous deathdealing gun on newly calculated plans based upon scientific principles, mechanically and mathematically correct. mildest mannered, kindest dispositioned men on earth. He is a North Carolinians by birth, but has made Cleveland his home for many years. He comes by the title of doctor honestly, being a medical man by training and profession, but as a boy he took naturally to mechanics, and thirty-seven years ago conceived the idea which resulted in the wonderful gun which [bears his name. He does not consider however, that he has reached the height of his achievements, although he says his weapon is hard to improve upon. The new eight-inch gun which is now being constructed for the Unit ance construction, he believes will be When asked how he ever came to devote his mind to inventing implements of war, Dr. Gatling laughingly replied I suppose you are thinking that I do

not look like a murderous or destructive individual. Well, the fact is, I am not. I have seldom told the history of my inventions, but I will say that the metives that prompted them were the most humane. That sounds strangely inconsistent, does it not? But it is tomers have expressed entire sa. none the less true. I remember the first idea that ever prompted me to invent a gun as well as if it were yesterday. In 1862 during the civil war, I lived in Indianapolis. Aimost daily I watched the departure of troops that had been sent there to be drilled before being sent to the front. The many touching partings I witnessed may well be imagined by those who remember those awful times. It was not alone the departings that I witnessed, for in a little time the trains began bringing back boxes. Sometimes dozen, sometimes twenty, in a single day. Each box, of course, contained a dead union soldier. The partings had made a sad impression on me, but nothing like the one those home-comings "I began to make enquiries, and soon

learned that a comparatively few of these soldiers were killed by bullets. Scarcely one in four, and the residied in hospitals from disease or in camp from exposure. Then it occurred to me that there were too many men in the service. I thought if something could be invented whereby one of these men could do the work of a hundred, why then the other ninety-nine might stay at home. Then there would be less widows and orphans in proportion. had invented quite a number of things notably the first wheat drill ever used, and I put my mind at work to invent a rapid-firing gun. My early difficulties were many. I made my plans easily enough, and finally had a battery of six guns built. When these guns were nearly completed and all paid for, some one-I doubt not a sepundrel of a rebel spy-set fire to the factory and they were destroyed I went to work again, and a battery of thirteen guns was made in Cincinnati and sent to Washington as soon as collected. Here there were more troubles. Gen. Ripley, the chief of ordnance, would have none of my gun Finally my agent started back west, but he met Gen. Butler, who was on his way to James river, and exhibited the battery to him. He was most enthusiastic, and purchased twelve guns and carriages and 1,000 pounds of am-munition for each for \$12,000. It has only been within the past year

or so that Dr. Gatling has devoted his attention to heavy calibre ordnance. The Gatling rapid fire gun is his pet and his hobby. He refers to it almost as one would refer to a favorite son and he delights to believe that the gun has done more for humanity than it has done in the way of destruction. In that belief Dr. Gatling has much to hear him out, for he refers to many cases where the mere presence of the See you get Carter's, Gatling gun has ended troubles after the bullets of troops have failed. "Only recently," said Dr. Gatling "Gen. Miles told me of an experience on the frontier-in Utah, I believe it was. A certain chief threatened to create a disturbance, and he had braves enough on the war-path to do a great deal of damage. Under a flig of truce Gen. Miles got him to come to his camp and see his power. One of the bottery of Gatlings was charged and turned on a distant tree. After about 800 shots had been fired, the chief, whose name was Crow Day, threw up his hands and left. He reported that the white man had 'devil gun,' and straightway he and his braves picked up their blankets and walked. The chief never stopped to see whether the tree had been hit or not."


