NEW YORK'S SCHOOL CHIEF.

Superintendent Maxwell Has Charge an Army of 400,000 Pupils.

William H. Maxwell, recently elected central superintendent of the school system of the city of New York, has been for ten years at the head of the Brooklyn -nhools. He was selected for this important position after Dr. Draper, president of the University of Illinois, positively declined to accept the position.

Dr. Maxwell was elected to his third term as superintendent of public instruction in Brooklyn last June and has been one of the most successful educators ever in charge of the Brooklyn schools. The only opposition to his candidacy was inspired by a number of teachers in Brooklyn with whom he was unpopular because of his strict insistence on discipline.

Dr. Maxwell was born near Stewartstown, County Tyrone, Ireland, in 1859. His father was a Presbyterian minister. He entered Queen's university in 1869 and received the degree of M. A. in 1874. From 1872 to 1874 Dr. Maxwell taught in the Victoria College For Women in Belfast and also in the Royal institution. In 1874 he came to America and entered the field of journalism, eventually becoming man

aging editor of the Brooklyn Times. 1880 and 1881 Dr. Maxwell taught school and delivered lectures in the evening high schools of Brooklyn, and in 1882 he was elected associate superintendent of public instruction. His term expired in 1887, but the next year he was appointed superintendent, which place he has retained until the present time.

In his new office Superintendent Maxwell will have charge of 8,000 teachers and an army of nearly 400,000 pupils. His salary will be \$8,000 a year. He is an advocate of the higher education, the kindergarten system and manual training. Dr. Maxwell introduced some years ago in the New York state council of superintendents a resolution which led to the introduction in the legislature of the bill once vetoed by Governor Hill and once by Governor Flower and finally signed by Governor Morton which requires that all teachers licensed or appointed in the elementary schools of the cities of New York state must have been graduated from a high school and from a school for the professional training of teachers or from institutions of equal or higher rank.

CLOUDS ARE GATHERING.

An Immoral Device To Say Spain Would

Madrid, April 2 -A semi-official statement has been issued which says: "One of the most immoral devices which is being employed at the present moment to injure Spain and mislead opinion in the United States is that of supposing that Spain would be disposed to recognize the independence of Cuba in return for the payment of an indemnity.

"Already, on the basis of jingoist fancies, the people have been led to believe that president McKinley based his proposale on this idea. This impression has been utilized in Wall street by every serious means to attract speculators into jingo circles and to compel them unconsciously

to aid in spreading uneasiness. "It is our duty to declare in the most authoritative manner that this is untrue. that no proposition containing the slightest allusion to the independence of Cuba, either with or without indemnity, has been made to the Spanish government, that the government would straightway reject any such proposition and that there is no party of statesmen in Spain disposed to listen to such a solution.

KEY WEST, Fla., April 2. - Commodore Schley's command is made up of the Massachuetts, second-class battleship Texas, which will return to Hampton Roads within the next few days; the armored crusier Brooklyn and the protected cruisers Minneapolis and Columbia. Opposed to there Spain would have the second-class battleship Victoria, armored cruisers Cristobal Colon and Infanta Maria Threeea and the protected cruiser Alfonso XIII, besides the hornet-like destroyer

and torpedo boats. William K. Vanderbilt, it is said, has decided, in the event of war with Spain, to present to the United States government a warship to cost \$5,000,000.

HALIFAN, N.S., April 2 -The Echo this afternoon prints the following: The Spanish government is evidently prepared to take no chances that peace will be preserved, for it is making all preparations for the worst, so that when hostilities commence it will be able to engage in the conflict as well equipped as possible. That Halifax is going to prove an impor-

tant centre for certain operations in the event of war has been made quite apparent by measures taken during the past week. It is known positively that representatives of Spain have been making careful enquiries at certain points in eastern Canada including Halifax relative to the quantity of food supplies for ships of war which can be secured for immediate delivery or at short notice. The supplies are to be delivered at the port of Halifax. Several provision houses in this city have been approached on the subject of filling heavy orders with quick despatch and have answered a number of questions on the points of quantities of certain articles of consumption available, how rapidly stocks could be replenished with live and dead

meate, canned goods and food supplies of all descriptions. According to the inquiries that have been prosecuted, the orders if they were given would be for quantities sufficient to supply a large fleet of warships at one time. Hundreds of heads of live stock and immense quantities of barrelled meats and canned goods would be called in for a single order. The inquiries made so far have been with the view of possessing all the necessary information on the subject so that when the time for action arrives, those interested may know what provisions can be secured at short notice and how long delay there may be before other goods could be deli vered. From the manner in which the applications for the information were given

that they might receive important orders at any moment.
