SHOULD BE SELECTED.

They Should Have a Voice in the Appointment of a New Archbishop . The Priests of Kingston Diocese Bave Done Well to Exercise Their Rights To Recommend a Successor-The Pope Will Approve the Action.

"A Priest" writes: 'I notice with

pleasure the announcement that the priests of the archdiocese of Kingston assembled to nominate a person who in their estimation would be a suitable successor to the late archbishop Cleary. I regard this as a move in the right direction, and am confident this manly attitude of the Wingston clergy in asserting the justice which would give them a voice in the election of a bishop to rule over them will meet with the approval of the whole Catholic body in the dominion, clerical and lay. According to the method at present pursued, the bishops of the ecclesiastical province only, within which a vacant occurs, have a voice in the appointment of a new bishop. Thus in the present instance, there are only two electors with whom it rests to appoint an archbishop of Kingston. 1 is true, however, that this election is not final, inasmuch as the pope has authority to set aside the three nummees whom there two electors choose, and also in the case of an archbishop the other archbishops have the right of making known to the pore the qualities of the nominee which in their e-treation make these nominees suitable or unsuitable for the But usually the choice of the pope is made from among the three whose names are sent to him. The mode of procedure which is now followed evidently ignores any right on the part of the clergy, to say who shall govern them as bishop, though they surely have a natural right to make their judgment weigh something in the matter, and they are more likely than strangers from other dioceses to form a correct estimate of the suitability of a candidate for so important a position in the locality with the needs of which they are thoroughly acquainted. It is a sound principle that a body of intelligent men like the priesthood of a diocese should have a voice in the election of one who is to rule over them, and there fore the prests of the Kingston diocese have done well to exercise their right of The city council was called in regular | recommending a successor to the vacant
