THE EVERY DAY CHURCH.

Rev. Morgan Wood, Toronto, who lectured in Kingston recently, is out as ar advocate of the Institutional church. Mr Wood is a young preacher of advanced ideas. He has always believed in striking out, in directing his attention to the great issues that concern the church. It is his aggressiveness, his boldness of action, his heroic attempt to meet the conditions of life with religious fervour, rather than the sublimity of his treatment, that has commended him to the favour and esteem of the people.

His attitude on the Institut onal church is characteristic of him. He has given it his study, and he sees in it the elements, the qualities, the "instincts" (if the word applies to the life of a church) that make for its success. He pictures the position of the average young man, who, either at home or in a boarding house, finds himself without the sec al attraction for which he pines, and wanders into the low theatre, the dance house, the brothel, the gambling den, the resort of evil men. Mr. Wood then pictures the church as waking up to a call to the rescue of these young men, as clearly as it is waking up to the call to any missionary enterprise. The church realizes that she must provide an off set, somehow, to the resorts referred to, "believing that God bids her lay her hand on anything, in itself sinless, by which she can foil her enemy and reach man with her blessed influence." She must entertain that she may save.

The Institutional council, now in operation in some of the larger cities, is declared to be the means by and through which the reformatory work is to be accomplished. Writing to the Toronto News Mt. Wood extole this church, "the church open seven days in the week, having in its care, and as a part of its regular work, institutions social, amusemental, educational, evangelistic, for the ministry of the whole man, and for the promotion of his growth in grace, and knowledge and character." What has this church : "A suitable corps of workers, and a varied equipment, aime to educate and conform, love of all that is pure and levely and in good respect." 


AN ATTACK UPON RITUALISM


