

IS THOUGHT TO BE RETURNING TO SPAIN.

It Will Probably Awalt the Enemy in Its Own Waters-United Statesers do Not Think Spain Will Send Her Fleet to Defend Either Havana or Porto Rico--A War Revenue Bill Will be Report. ed to the United States Committee on Saturday.

WASHINGTON, April 22.-Adjutant-gen eral Corbin of the army is in receipt of telegrams from commanding officers of troops throughout the country, showing that every regiment of infantry and cavalry and light batteries of artillery ordered to the south has started on its way there. In many cases, where the distances were not over two days' travel to the mobilizing points, the regiments have reached their destinations. It is hoped that all will have been settled comfortably and the discipline of military life be fully under way when Gen. Miles and his staff start on their tour of inspection in the latter par

of the weak. The threat of the Spanish newspapers t give United States a surprise, in the shape of a naval visitation, does not cause any particular uneasiness at the navy depart ment, and although nothing positive is known as to the destination of the Spanish squadron, it is surmised that it has started on its return to Spain, 1,000 miles distant from Cape Verde, thus indicating a pur pose to await an engagement in their own waters. It is likely that in this event the first port made will be the Canary islands, distant about 825 miles from St. Vincent, and a Spanish possespartially fortified and a fair base. It is not believed that the Spanish naval commander would be foolish enough to run the risk of taking his torpedo flotilla across the Atlantic in the attempt to defend either Porto Rico or Havana. It is about 2,500 miles from Cape Verde to Porto Rico and in the present stormy season on the North Atlantic the torpedo boat flotilla would have all it could do to keep afloat and would be exposed to destruction at the hands of the smallest swift cruiser sent to intercept it.

Plain, Simple Question To Be Submitted Form Of The Ballot.

OTTAWA, April 21 -"Are you in favor of the passing of an act prohibiting the importation, manufacture or sale of spirits, wine, ale, beer, cider and all other alcoholic liquors as beverages?" This is the plain, direct and simple question that the government, true to the pledge of the liberal party, will submit to the people of Canada upon a day in the near future to be named by proclamation. The issue will not be burdened by subsidiary considerations, such as the question o meeting the deficiency of revenue that must result from the adoption of a prohi bitory measure, or of the inevitable difficulty of enforcing the law if it should be enacted. Every person who will be entitled to vote in election of a member to the house of commons under the franchise bill now before parliament shall be entitled to vote on the plebiscite. The voter will simply answer "yee" or "no" to the question by so marking a specially prepared ballot that will be provided. Provision is made for the representation at the polls of the two sides of the liquor question. There are the salient features of the plebiscite bill submitted to the house to day by Hon. Sidney Fisher, whose record as a sincere and consistent advocate of prohibition in parliament and in the country is well known. Mr. Fisher, following the usual practice in introducing a government measure, simply made a statement of its provisions, leaving whatever arguments may be necessary to be adduced in its justification to the time for the eecond reading.
