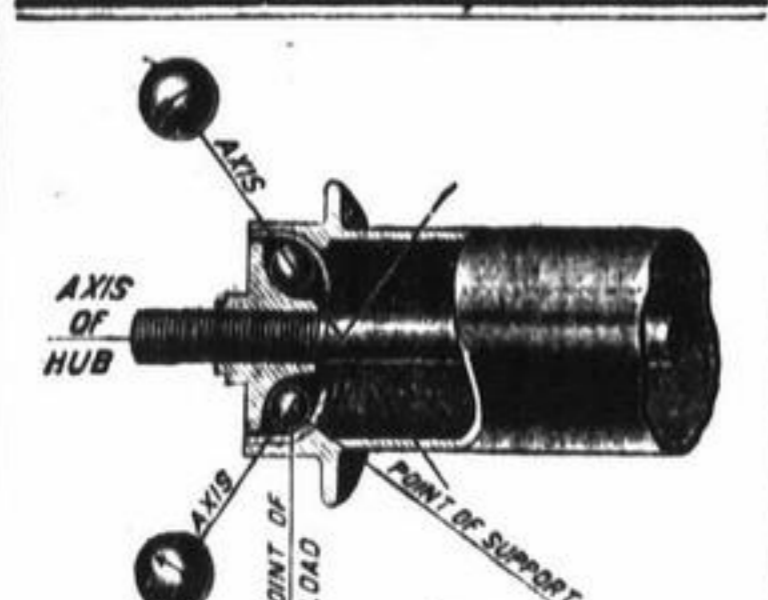

SPANIARDS ARE ANGRY.

Need No Time To Return Insulting Challenges.

THE SPANISH SQUADRON IS THOUGHT TO BE RETURNING TO SPAIN.

It Will Probably Await the Enemy in Its Own Waters. Waters Tatted Stealers Do Not Think Spain Will Send Her Fleet to Defend Either Havana or Porto Rico.—A War Revenue Bill Will Be Reported to the United States Committee on Saturday.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Adjutant-general Corbin of the army is in receipt of telegrams from commanding officers of troops throughout the country, showing that every regiment of infantry and cavalry and light batteries of artillery ordered to the south has started on its way there.

The Spanish newspaper gives the United States a surprise, in the report of a naval visitation. It does not cast any particular uneasiness at the navy department, and although nothing positive is known as to the destination of the Spanish squadron, it is surmised that it has started on its return to Spain, 1,000 miles distant from Cape Verde, thus indicating a purpose to await an engagement in their own waters.

The Squadron's Strength. The North Atlantic squadron, under captain Sampson's command, makes a splendid array of fine vessels, comprising battleships such as the Iowa and Indiana, monitors like the Puritan, Terror and Amphitrite, armored cruisers like the New York flagship, protected cruisers such as the Cincinnati, Marblehead and Montgomery, gunboats like the Vicksburg, Wybiting and Annapolis, regular torpedo boats such as the Ericsson, Cushing, Winslow, not to speak of the large number of fast yachts and other vessels that have been added to the fleet by purchase.

Madrid, April 22.—United States minister Woodford left here at four o'clock yesterday. The British charge d'affaires, Mr. Barclay, and the secretary of the German embassy saw the United States minister off. There was a great jingo demonstration at the station.

IT WAS A LARGE STEAL.

San Francisco's Treasurer Takes \$160,000 Of Gold.

OPENED THE MONEY BAGS OF THE CITY TREASURY AND ABSTRACTED COIN.

The Stealing Has Been Going On For Years. Inspectors Have Overlooked The Deceit.—While somewhat intoxicated Widber Dropped a Remark That Led to Investigation and to His Detention. Previously Noted For His Honesty and Ability.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 22.—City treasurer Augustus C. Widber, it was found today, is a defaulter for at least \$160,000, and perhaps the amount of his peculations will reach \$200,000. Widber has disappeared, and no trace of him has yet been discovered.

Several months ago one of his deputies disappeared, leaving a deficit, and it is now learned that Widber was involved in this theft. He is said to have lavished most of his money on race tracks and women. He had been playing the races for months and had even started a stable. He won at the start but had lost heavily ever since.

PROHIBITION BILL.

Plain, Simple Question To Be Submitted.—Form Of The Bill. OTTAWA, April 21.—"Are you in favor of the passing of an act prohibiting the importation, manufacture or sale of spirituous wine, beer, cider, and all other alcoholic liquors as beverages?" This is the plain, direct and simple question that the government, true to the pledge of the liberal party, will submit to the people of Canada upon a day in the near future to be named by proclamation.

MADE A STRIKE.

HAVANA TREASURY EMPTY.

A Deficit of Over Two Million Dollars Reported by the Mayor. HAVANA, Cuba, April 22.—There is a deficit of \$2,304,532.88 in the treasury of Havana. The mayor declares it is chargeable to the previous administration, which spent large sums to pay expenses not included in the budget.

THE CLAIM OF MANITOBA.

Federal Government Agrees to Pay a Part of It With Interest. OTTAWA, April 22.—A return brought down regarding Manitoba's claim shows that it aggregates \$704,000. Of that sum \$294,456 is an account of the legislative allowed to other provinces. The balance is interest on these sums to date. The government has agreed to pay the claims on account of the legislative buildings with interest, but the other demand is not yet decided upon.

OFFICIALLY WHITEWASHED.

Cecil Rhodes Re-Elected Director of South African Chartered Company. LONDON, April 22.—The re-election of Cecil Rhodes as a director of the South African chartered company, at to-day's annual meeting of the shareholders of that concern, was accomplished without a breath of opposition from the government, a fact which is regarded as officially whitewashing, so far as the government is concerned. Mr. Rhodes and his colleagues for their part in the Jamieson raid. The government acts in the matter with its eye to the future of British supremacy in South Africa, and as it is a foregone conclusion that Mr. Rhodes will undoubtedly be of Cape Colony, it would undoubtedly be poor policy, considering his strength and influence over that portion of the queen's dominions, for the home government to oppose him in his desire for re-election to the directorate of the chartered company.
