

WASHINGTON, April 23.-There were two further important steps in Washington yesterday towards actual hostilities, not to mention the overt act involved in the seizure of the Spanish vessel Buenaventura, off Key West.

The first step was the issue by the president of his proclamation announcing to the world a blockade of a number of Cuban ports and the second was the signing by him of the bill providing for the utilization of the volunteer forces in war. Then, in addition, there was a notable retirement from the navy department in the case of captain R. B. Bradford, chief of the equip ment division. He leaves to enter active

Following up the formalities beginning with the blockade proclamation, the state department yesterday afternoon addressed an identical note to all of the representatives of foreign nations accredited to Washington, notifying them of the policy to be pursued by the United States government in the matter of privateering and


