Germany and Britain May A t Together.

THE ARTICLES ARE DEFINED

THAT UNITED STATES CONSID-ERS CONTRABAND OF WAR.

The Invasion Of Cuba Will Be Led by Gen. Miles-ASignal For Bombardment-The Spanish Firet Has Left Cape Verde islands-Havana Is Said To Be In A State of Panic-The Men Will Be Held as Prisoners of War-The Latest News NEW YORK, April 29.—A London special

says that it is stated here that the German government has asked the British foreign office in relation to the protection of British interests in the Philippines in vie w of the contemplated United States attack, The Germans are evidently desirous of cooperating with Great Britain, the commerce of both far outweighing that of Spain itself.

A special from Washington says the state department at Washington is preparing a proclamation defining articles contraband of war and liable to seizure upon the high seas. The list includes all munitions of war, coal and all articles and materials which could be used in the manufacture of war materials or in the repair or fitting out of hostile vessels. Goods hostile in character but not bound to a bostile port will not be considered contra-

A Washington special to the Journal says: Gen. Miles will personally lead the invasion of Cuba. Ten thousand troops will accompany him, working in conjunction with the navy and insurgent forces. Havana is to be attacked from the rear. The Red Cross steamer State, of Texas, is to be sent ahead with supplies for the Cubane. If the Spaniards fire upon it that will be the signal for bombardment.

A Havana special to the Journal says: The news from Madrid is that the United States has completed plans for the invasion of Havana; this, with the silencing of Matanzas batteries has thrown the city into a panic. Gen. Blanco considers the Madame Kennedy Possesses the Secretwater batteries equal to repulsing the United States ships and says they will do great havoc. Work on the defences in rear of the city are pushed night and day. There is a panicky feeling in the city.

A Kingston, Jamaica, special to the Journal says: Detail plans for a combined land and sea conquest of Santiago were completed to day and will be actually put in operation in a few dars by the navy, supported by a landing force from the United States army. Santiago is next in importance to Havana. It is the strong. hold of the Spaniards, commanding the south and east ends of Cuba, procisely as Havana is the military key to the north the Spanish commander, has about 250, 000 men, it is said, with four small gunboats and one cruiser in the harbor.

A Key West special to the Herald says A Spanish senorita, one of twenty-four Spanish passengers on the captured steam. ship Panama, has betrayed the fact that her compatriot fellow voyagers were going to join the Spanish army and were not refugees, and their passages had been paid by the late Spanish consul at New York. Learning the facts the attorney general in Washington ordered that the men be held as prisoners of war.

A Key West special to the World says A posse of United States marshals put aboard the captured Spanish steamer Catalina are accused of looting her and other ships to the amount of \$50,000. Washington has been asked for a guard to protect the seized ships against further loot-

Heard From Many Points.

The Spanish squadron sailed to-day from Cape Verde islands; destination unknown. The fleet comprises four armoured cruisers of the first-class, three torpedo boat destroyers and one transport. The battleship Pelayo unexpectedly reached Cadiz to-day. If the navy meets with serious reverses an uprising of the Spanish people

A Washington special assures Brooklyn that Atlantic coast cities have nothing to fear from Spanish war vessels and the Dons will receive a "warm reception should they venture too near.'

The Cuban junta will issue a proclamation urging insurgents to place themselves under the stars and stripes as soon as the colors shall be raised on Cuban soil and to have absolute confidence in the fair intentions of president McKinley and the ad-

A declaration of neutrality, like that of 1870 in the case of the Franco-Pruesian war, will be published to-day by Portugal. Mexico's perfect neutrality in the war has been declared and published. There is nervousness in the strategy

board concerning the steamer Paris. Sev-

eral Spanish warships must be eluded to secure her safety. The Emperador Carlos V is reconnoitering along the Alantic coast of Europe, hunting up United States merchantmen, in retaliation for the prizes captured by

the North Atlantic squadron. A bill providing for insuring the lives of soldiers and sailors by the United States government will be introduced in congress next week. This measure provides a department of insurance, and a policy is to be issued to each soldier when he enlists. No premiums are to be paid on these policies, which are to be issued in lieu of any possible claim the insured may have in

the future for pensions. The leaders in the senate and the house have agreed that congress shall not adjourn until the war is over. Recess will be taken from time to time, for short

The State Steps In.

Henry Dixon, a colored man, eighty years old, died in Watertown, N.Y., in February, leaving an estate valued at about \$9,000. During his life he had been a Mothodist, but a few days before his death, made a will bequeathing the bulk of his property to the Catholic church. The state of New York has now stepped in and objects to the will, claiming that he was was not his free, unconstrained or voluntary act. If the will is set spicle, an effort to prove a previous one, giving his proper-ty to Bethany Methodist Episcopal church, will be made.

The steamship Andrew Carnegie, Chicago, brought 230,000 bushele of corn to Owen Sound. This is said to be the largest cargo of corn ever floated on fresh water.

Lord Aberdeen and Cabinet Ministers Have Expressed Approval of its Coming. I fully appreciate the magnitude of the undertaking, and feel that the country owes the promoter of it a great debt of gratitude. I had the pleasure of being present at the Peace jubilee in Boston, in 1872, and was present in the Coliseum on the 4th of July, I think it was, when Dan Godfrey, by his presence of mind saved the tens of thousands of people assembled there from a terrible calamity. The audience had ecarcely got seated when a terrific storm of wind and thunder and lighnting arose, and somehow the impression got about that the building was on fire. There was a terrible stampde. Thousands of people coming in were met by thou-ands of people coming out. In the midst of this confusion Dan Godfrey stepped upon the platform and called upon his band to play the "Star Spangled Banner," as coolly as if nothing had happened. This coolness quieted the crowd, and a serious calamity




