Naval And Military Operations Being Arranged.

THE OBJECTIVE POINT OF SAMP SON'S FLEET.

an Attack Will Also be Made in Cuba—The Movement on Land And Sea Will be Quick. Vigorous And Decisive - It is Probable That the United States Will Attack the Canarles, an Admirable Base

For Operations Against Spain. WASHINGTON, May 11.-Naval and military operations against Porto Rico will begin simultaneously with those to be directed against Cuba. In anticipation of the early completion of naval work the war which will land under the fire of the guns of United States war vessels and capture the city of San Juan. The withdrawal of the Spanish fleet to Cadiz leaves it out of consideration for the present, and San Juan will now be rear - admiral Sampson's objective point. Before attack. suggested that he may put in to Samana bay for that purpose. The United States consul at St. Thomas has purchased all the coal available at that point and the authorities say there is sufficient fuel there for all of his ships, but to make assurance doubly sure the steamer St. Paul will take a large quantity of coal to him from Hampton Roads. Believing that there are a large number of small crafts flying the Spanish flag in Porto Rican waters it will be the duty of rear-admiral Sampson to destroy or capture them as promptly as

Cuba is to be invaded and an attack made upon Havana by the army from the rear and by the navy from the front within a week from yesterday. The movement on both land and sea will be quick, vigorous and decisive. An army is to be promptly landed in Cuba of sufficient size to preclude the possibility of a single defeat. There is to be no delay in getting regulars and volunteers on Cuban soil.

In line with this policy orders were is sued by adjutant-general Corbin yesterday countermanding the orders of Monday to reconcentrate 45,000 volunteers at Chickamauga Park. It is understood that the president is very anxious to have the invasion of Cuba begin as soon as possible. The troops ordered on Monday to mobilize at Chickamauga are to go as soon as they are mustered into Tampa, Mobile and New Orleans. It is said that Col.
