

THREE MEN.

Brought Death to One of Them-They Experleaced Terrible Hardships - Their Tougues Were Swollen - The Authorities to Make Investigation.

SAN DIEGO, May 11.—According to the story told by E. Moore, of this city, and Jay S. Green, Los Angeles, who arrived here last night from the Colorado desert, Joseph S. Stanley, Bakerefield, is dead ab Coyote Wells from the effects of the terrible hardships experienced by the three young men a week ago. There is some difference, however, in the stories told by Moore and Green, and until some investigation has been made by the authorities the exact

facts will not be known. Green's story is that the three men left San Diego nine days ago, intending to drive to Yuma, where Moere was to remain, and the other two men were to continue by waggon to Texas. They had one horse, with plenty of provisions in the waggon, but only carried water enough to

last from one watering place to another. At Buzzards' Roost, half way across the desert, between Campo and Yuma, the horse refused to drink, and was so weak that it could not proceed.
