the solemnity of British crowds as contrasted with the gayety of French gatherings. People think the English do not know what to do with themselves on a holiday and that they get drunk from sheer ennul. Those who think this have never lived in the cotton manufacturing districts of Lancashire and still less have they been to Blackpool, the Concy Island of every factory hand from Accrington to Blackburn, for even to be in this delectable spot is to be happy, apart from any amusement offered there. Every factory town gives its hands a vacation of a week in the season, and they betake themselves to Blackpool. Not a soul among the factory people is left in town-man, woman or child-save the sick or bedridden. Each town must choose a different week for its holiday, for Blackpool, though quite a large place, could not contain all the hordes that descend upon it, and it would be impossible to get the people to go to any other place for their outing.

BLACKPOOL GAYETY.

For days beforehand the "lasses" are seen on the street, their heads bristling with crimping pins or curl papers, preparing the marvelous holiday bang which sticks out indefinitely in front, a veritable haystack. The shawl worn over the head on working days is scornfully cast aside, and in its place is worn a hat unlike anything ever seen by American eyes. Monstrous in shape and huge in size is this hat and covered with hows of ribbon startling in color. Add feathers and flowers galore, and you have a structure which merits a

At this time of general exodus trains start at 2 and 4 o'clock in the morning, filled with joyful, noisy, singing people. They seem never to stop eating, drinking and singing, and they keep it up during

the entire week Blackpool is an elongated town, stretched out three miles along the coast, and entirely composed of ledging houses, hotels "publics"—myriads of "publics," eyery other house being of this description, and each and all are jammed with people. The lodging houses are jammed, too, the saying being that as soon as one man gets out of a bed another is ready to occupy it. For what use is a bed to one, after all, when one isn't in it? It would be snobbish to wish to retain it.

In Blackpool there are no toboggan Scotsman . July 9th, 6 p.m slides or other such manifold shows as we get up to tickle the fancy of our Concy Island public. Simple amusements suffice the cheerful Lancashire lad and his broad faced, buxom lass. Chief among these is bathing or "paddling." And to unwonted American eyes the bathing beach is a strange sight. The men and women bathe on different parts of the beach. The men's costume consists merely of "tights," while that worn by the women is of some light cotton material, generally pink in color, a blouse cut low in the neck, with short sleeves and drawers to the knee-no stockings, no skirt. Those who have these costumes are considered quite aristocratic, for most of the lasses merely gather their skirts high around them in the most naive fashion and paddle away serencly.

But it is on the promenade that the crowd swarms thickest and the noise is greatest. This is a broad asphalt walk, raised from the sand and stretching from one end of the town to the other. Here is a never ending procession. They come shoving and pushing eight or ten abreast, every one singing "Daisy Bell," "The Old Kent Road" or some other antiquated topical song. It takes some time for a new song to make its way to Blackpool. The people jostle and push and poke each other in the ribs, and all are good natured and shining faced and vulgar.

Quebec Steamship Co., Limited. Introductions are not necessary. Total strongers chaff each other as they pass, while the children everywhere suck RIVER AND GULF ST. LAWRENCE oranges or blow whistles. But with all this riding and strolling and singing one gets a great thirst, and there is always a "public" at hand. You hear the twanging of a banjo in the distance and you join the crowd which flecks around it. It heralds the "nigger minstrels," popular everywhere in England.

> Then you hear some one suggesting a visit to "Uncle Tom's Cabin," and you get into the electric car-the pride of Blackpool and the only one nearer than Liverpool, and most wonderfully slow it is. In the car the singing and the good natured horse play continue. "Uncle Tom's Cabin" proves to be a little but on a bluft in front of which stand images of Uncle Tom and Little Eva. Inside the principal attractions are marionettes, and ginger pop and the sucking of oranges are redoubled. Outside groups of men and women are throwing cocoanuts at painted ir a res. If you hit the image three times, you get the cocoanut. This is all the attraction there is to draw one to "Uncle Tom's Cabin," yet it is filled day in and day out with a never failing crowd. You must not forget to visit the Eiffel tower, the crowning glory of Blackpool, and exactly like the original one in Paris, only half its size. Afterward if you are bold and enterprising

you can go out for a "sail." But this haleyon time cannot last forever, and all too soon the week is at an end. The last orange has been sucked. Goodby to Uncle Tom and Little Eva and to the endless walking and singing on the promenade. Next week it will be work again for these people, but Blackpool is no loser, for it will be invaded by a new horde and still another, until it settles down for its winter sleep.-New York Commercial Advertiser.

Our First War Transla.

The outbreak of the Revolutionary was found the patriots without a navy. Congress had to create one. Four merchantmen were first purchased, hastily equipped with guns and sent to sea as cruisers, but their defects as war vessels soon became so apparent that congress determined at once to set about the building of a navy. On Oct. 3, 1775, congress ordered two cruisers built, and on Dec. 18 the order was increased to five 32 gun ships, five 28 gun ships and three 24 gun ships. They were to be ready for the sea by the follow ing April. The names given to the 13 ressels were Boston, Congress, Effingham, Delaware, Hancock, Montgomery, Providence, Raleigh, Trumbull, Virginia, Warren, Washington and Randolph. These were the first war vessels constructed in the United States.

The first commander in chief was Ezekiel Hopkins of Rhode Island, a young brother of Congressman Stephen Hopkins. He was appointed to this high office on Dea. 92, 1775.—Boston Transcript.

FLOWER VIEWING IN JAPAN.

A National Custom to Make Eamily Excursions In Blossom Times Miss Ida Tigner Hednett writes of "The Little Japanese at Home" in St. Nicholas.

Miss Hodnett says: It is one of the national customs to go out on excursions, in parties of two or three families, to view the flowering trees and plants in their season. The Japanese love all flowers, but prefer those to which they look up-the flowers of trees. They visit the plum blessoms in February or early March; the cherry, especially beloved, in April; the lotus in July, azaleas during the summer, chry anthemums in the autumn and camellias in December. In the pleasure grounds connected with every temple there are always magnificent collections of flowers. An expedition especially to see the flowers is called a hanami, or flower view.

The bank of the Sumida river, which crosses the city of Tokyo, is covered with cherry trees. These give a pleasant shade, and the spot is a favorite promenade for the citizens all the year round, but in time of "cherry bloom" the crowds that throng the avenue are larger than ever. It is crowded on moonlight pights and also when the snow lies freshly fallen.

Being fully alive to the beauty of their country, wherever there is a point from which a picturesque view may be obtained the Japanese will build a pavilion, or a tenhouse, or some similar place of repose, from which the eyes may feast on the lovely landscape. In the family pionics or excursions, which are frequent, some place of beautiful situation from which there is a good view either of land or sea is always selected.

These expeditions are not discontinued even when the cold of winter comes. Snow scenes are greatly enjoyed, and when the freshly fallen snow is lying on the ground numerous parties are seen at points commanding a fine view. The children are never excluded, but accompany their elders on all such occasions.

An Egyptian Village.

"An Artist Among the Fellaheen" is the title of an article in The Century by R. Talbot Kelly, the English artist. Mr Kelly says:

The country about Kahboona is, I think the most beautiful in Egypt. Being the center of the date growing industry, large groves of palms are to numerous as to be almost one continuous forest, broken here and there by small open patches of bereime and vegetables, principally beans, the fragrance of which in the early spring is delicious and, under the hot sun and with the drowsy hum of the wild bees, makes one long to lie in the shade of the trees and dream forever. The town itself is buried in the midst of a particularly dense grove, and on one side is the wand birkeh, or pool of infiltrated water, common to all villages, and meaning so much illness and epidemic among the people. These birkeh are formed by the excavation of the mud with which the houses are built, and, filling with water, they usually become open cesspools into which all the filth of the village percolates, breeding millions of mosquitoes as well as malaria. As if this were not enough, the village cemetery was placed on the brink of the pool, the graves being below the water level, and I actually saw women drawing water from the pool for demestic usel Needless to say, I touched no water in this village, except that which my own men brought from a distance.




