NEW YORK, June 21-Information has just been received in Washington of the attempted assassination in Havana of captain general Blanco by Mariano Salva, a young member of the volunteer army, and of a condition of affairs in the Cuban capital almost bordering on revolution as a consequence. The volunteers parade about a more peaceful state of affairs.

his death by shooting Blanco. When ar. good use of his time. rested young Salvas said he did not care what became of him, all that he had lived for was to avenge the death of his brother. The shot took effect in Blanco's left leg, above the thigh, and is very painful.

Madrid, June 21. - In an interview at Cartagena Capt. Aunon, minister of marine, stated that the third equadron, the base of which is the Lepanco, the Prin cessa de Austurias and the Cardinal Ciserno, will be ready in a month's time. He said that admiral Camara's equadron coneisted of fourteen ships, including torpedo boat destroyers and transatlantics with a large force for landing.
