FORMING ANOTHER FLEET.

CAPTAIN CASGRAIN, R E.

To Succeed Colonel Lake as Quartermaster-General. It is announced in the last issue of the

Broad Arrow that captain Philippe de Perron Caegrain, R.E , has been nominated by lord Lansdowne, secretary of war, as quartermaster-general of the Canadian forces, in place of Col. Lake, who retires to rejoin his regiment. Captain Casgrain is one of the graduates of the Royal military college, Kingston, who has had a brilliant career in the imperial service. Graduating with highest honors from the military college in 1863, he served in the north west rebellion as adjutant of the 9th battalion of Quebec, and next year obtained his commission in the Royal engineers. After some time in Chatham, he was sent so India, where he remained five years, erving as engineer to the Manipur field force. During the campaign Capt. Cas-(rain constructed in twenty-four hours a cemporary floating bridge across the Barak river, over which the Silcar column passed to the capture of Manipur. This feat of engineering received high commendation from the war office authorities. During his service in India captain Casgrain pass-ed his examination in Hindustanee. The dia he qualified in the German and Russian languages and for some time acted as military interpreter to the British embassy at

Captain Casgrain is a brother of J. B. Caegrain, sons of P. P. B. Caegrain, for many years member of parliament for L'Islet, and a cousin of Thos. Chase Casgrain, M. P.

SPAIN GETTING A THIRD ONE READY AT CADIZ.

Watson Will Go At Once to Attack the Spanish Coast Towns-He Will Destroy Every Spanish Ship He Can Find - To Wipe Spain Out Completely as a Bea

MADRID, June 29. - According to announcement printed this morning the queen regent intends immediately to sign a decree providing for the formation at Cadiz of an auxiliary cruiser division, consisting of the Alfonso XIII, Joaquim Del Palago, Cieduad, De Cadiz and Metoro.

WASHINGTON, June 29 -The news from Spain indicates that the threat of invasion from the United States has made a deep impression. Watson's squadron will go to Spain anyway. The United States government has determined to wipe Spain out completely as a sea power, and is ready to meet the Cadiz fleet anywhere. The shipyards at Ferrol, Corruna and Carthagenia will be bombarded, while every auxiliary cruiser and every reserve warship will be the especial prey of the two heavy battleships and the swift cruisers of Watson's
