Admiral Camara

LONDON, June 29.—Admiral Camara at his present rate of progress cannot reach the Philippines before sixty days. It is reported that he is carrying 40,000 (?) tons of coal and that the second class cabins of the auxiliary cruiser Rapido are stuffed with provisions. The Cairo correspondent of the Daily Mail says: Lord Cromer has stopped a French firm from coaling Admiral Camara's squadron, pending instructions from London's admiralty.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—General Shafter has reported to the war department that Spanish troops numbering 3,000, with pack trains and cattle, are advancing from Manzanillo and are now within fifty-four miles of Santiago. This would seem to indicate that general Pando has not been turned back, as reported to the Americans on Monday.

Had A Collision

WASHINGTON, June 29.—An encounter between two brigades occurred yesterday at the camp of the New York State army in Cuba at Camp Panther. Watson's squadron will probably sail at the end of the week to bombard the Spanish coast.

FORMING ANOTHER FLEET.

SPAIN GETTING A THIRD ONE READY AT CADIZ.

Watson Will Go At Once to Attack the Spanish Coast Towns—He Will Destroy Every Spanish Ship He Can Find—Wipe Spain Out Completely as a Sea Power.

MADRID, June 29.—According to an announcement printed this morning the queen regent intends immediately to sign a decree providing for the formation at Cadiz of an auxiliary cruiser division, commanded by the Alfonso XIII, Joaquin Del Palago, Ciudad, De Cadiz and Mexico.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—The news from Spain indicates that the threat of invasion from the United States has made a deep impression. Watson's squadron will go to Spain anyway. The United States government has determined to wipe Spain out completely as a sea power, and is ready to meet the Cadiz fleet anywhere.
