



Rev. Henry F, Lyte. In the year 1818 a young clergyman residing at Cornwall, England, was called to visit an aged clergyman as he lay on his death-bed. He found him overwhelmed with fear and wholly unprepared for the change that was shortly to take place. After a time of earnest prayer and study waist. of the Scriptures he seemed more resigned, and both came to the knowledge of Christian doctrine and the possession of Christian peace. In speaking of this incident later, the younger man said: "I then began to study my Bible, and to preach in another manner than I had previously done."

The young minister was Rev. Henry F. Lyte, who was born at Kelso, Roxburgh. shire, in 1783. He studied at Trinity College, and held a curacy in Wexford for some time, and afterwards went down to the coast of Devon to labor among the unquenchable zeal won for him many friends, who loved him with the proverbial love of men toughened by hardships, and women wearied with longings for fulled storms and cloudless skies. In return he gave them all the affection of a faithful pastor.


