GAVE A STIRRING SERMON.

REV. J. E. STARR'S MISSIONARY ADDRESS LAST EVENING.

The Macedonian Cry Must be Heeded—The Missionary's Call for the Gospel.

Rev. J. E. Starr preached his annual missionary sermon last evening to a fair-sized congregation, in St. Andrew's street Methodist church, taking his text from Acts xvi-9, "Come over into Macedonia and help us."

Heavenly nations see that christian nations are not the only ones of this earth.

The work of the missionaries pays in hard, solid dollars. According to Rev. Arthur T. Pierson, while it costs \$20 to convert a pagan sinner, it costs \$200 to convert a christian sinner.

The inestimable value of missionary work is shown in a comparison of the work of the United States and the Canadian governments.

Christianity has made more progress in the last eighty years than was made in the preceding 1,800 years.

The spectacle of Great Britain sending the flower of her youth and manhood, led by her greatest general, over the burning sands of Arabia, to rescue one of her noblest sons, Gen. Gordon, besieged in Khartoum, stands magnificently alone in history, as a brilliant and splendid achievement.

Church of England Missions. Last evening in St. James' church, Rev. C. J. Hatton, of Christ Church, Belleville, delivered his address on "The Church of England Missions."

A SUNDAY AMID THE SNOW.

CAME DOWN UNTIL IT FILLED EVERY PATH.

The Street Railway Company Has Had a Merry War—The Streets are Filled High With the Beautiful—Shovelers are Busy.

There is no lack of snow to-day. No longer is the wish heard for more of the beautiful, but good, snow. On Thursday night the weather suddenly and cheerfully changed while people were quietly sleeping, and when the hard-working citizen got up on Friday morning, he found the snow piled up on the roofs and walls, and tried to bury the tracks along the sidewalks, and the street railway rails of sight. The snow was intensely cold and red noses and blue lips were to be seen everywhere, but extra men were placed along the sidewalks for pedestrians, especially those who had no rubbers on.

All day Friday the snow came down and the wind whirled it into drifts and whipped it up against the houses and the fences and walls, and tried to bury the tracks along the sidewalks, and the street railway rails of sight. The snow was intensely cold and red noses and blue lips were to be seen everywhere, but extra men were placed along the sidewalks for pedestrians, especially those who had no rubbers on.

Somehow towards evening the sound of the ubiquitous snow-shovel began to be heard from all quarters. Busy the citizens worked to get the walks in front of the houses cleared off, and the snow piled up on the sidewalks, and the street railway rails of sight. The snow was intensely cold and red noses and blue lips were to be seen everywhere, but extra men were placed along the sidewalks for pedestrians, especially those who had no rubbers on.

On Saturday the storm continued and snow still came down. In all directions men were to be seen men and boys on the roofs of houses, sheds, and out-buildings, shoveling the accumulated snow down, for several structures had come to grief on Friday through the heavy loads borne by the roofs. The snow piled up on the sidewalks, and the street railway rails of sight. The snow was intensely cold and red noses and blue lips were to be seen everywhere, but extra men were placed along the sidewalks for pedestrians, especially those who had no rubbers on.

The big snow fall has proved a blessing to many unemployed men, to whom it has afforded work which they otherwise would not have had. The city put a large force to work clearing off the crossings and sidewalks and drawing the surplus to places where it was most needed. The men, or a large proportion of them, are still at work and will have employment for some days to come. To the water works department the heavy snow acts as a friend, as much as it is a foe to the street carmen. There is every apparent prospect that the fall will continue, and in the civic department affected, preparations will be made to meet the emergency.

Owing to the quantity of snow which has fallen, work could not be carried on in the M. T. Co's shipyard, and the men have been given a few holidays. The storm was a good excuse for people to spend the day at home in a lazy way. They rested, read, smoked and dreamily looked at the whirling snow outside. It is quite probable that the winter season will be found in any city satisfactory.

Residents of the western portion of the city, more particularly those living adjacent to Union street, find the car track quite a boon during these winter storms. The snow piled up on the sidewalks, and the street railway rails of sight. The snow was intensely cold and red noses and blue lips were to be seen everywhere, but extra men were placed along the sidewalks for pedestrians, especially those who had no rubbers on.

Take the Snow Elsewhere. Ald. Richardson this morning ordered that no more snow taken off the streets be deposited in the park. Since the city has been treated to such a super-abundance of the beautiful the surplus from the streets in the western portion of the city has been drawn to that place. Ald. Richardson holds that if the city makes a habit of this kind, the park private citizens will be obliged to make a bad example in the matter.
