




In other instances they are ascribed to sudden and temporary aberration of mind, while in many there is absolutely no motive or cause that can be discovered, even the very method of disappearance remaining a matter for mere



assumed the name of John Orth, sailed some four years ago on board his good ship, the Marguerite, from La Plata for Valparaiso. The Marguerite was spoken half way between La Plata and Cape Horn, but after that passed out of human sight forever and was never heard of again, all the efforts made by the Austrian, the Chilean and other South American governments to find some trace of the archduke's fate proving futile.

Nor is the Earl of Aberdeen English peer who stands in danger of being divested of his title and estates at any moment by an appearance of the rightful lord. There is, for instance, the present Lord Belhaven, who succeeded to a peerage only in consequence of the late lord's younger brother having disappeared while on a trip from San Francisco to New Zealand. Two claimants to the peerage have recently appeared, one hailing from India and the other from New Zealand, each asserting himself to be the missing brother. This Belhaven peerage is particularly unfortunate in this respect, as in the last two centuries tedious and costly litigation has attended the succession in almost every instance.

Had not Sir Roger Tichborne disappeared at sea while on a journey from Valparaiso to Australia, the English government would never have been compelled to spend \$500,000 in legal proceedings against the impostor Orton, who declared himsel! to be the missing baronet. His claim was one of the most clever and impudent swindles of the century, even the mother of the real Sir Roger being taken in thereby. Then there is Lord Edward St. Maur. son of the "Sheridan" duke of Somerset. who vanished at sea on his way from Bombay to Aden at the close of a hunting expedition in the northern part of India. His disappearance resulted in the ancient dukedom passing into the possession of the twelfth duke's younger brother, with whom his grace was at daggers drawn, and upon whom he vented his spite by






