We started with 16,073 ships, of 1,540,000 tons, manned by 118,000 men, and with a navy of 141 ships of the line. 155 frigates and 129 small vessels. We had to deal with a thoroughly inefficient enemy, disorganized by revolution and distracted by intestinal quarrels. From the first hour of war our military superiority was unchallenged. The declaration of war, however, caused a very serious contraction of trade. There were many failures, and a temporary loan of £5,000,000 was necessary to avert panic. This measure had a most salutary effect, and only £3,855,000 was applied for. Early in the struggle the attack upon our commerce began. Ships of war and privateers of all sorts fell upon it. 
