MANY SPOILED BALLOTS.

THE BALLOT NOT UNDERSTOOD AND MANY SPOILED.
The Marks Were Not in the Moon as Was the Aim of the Patience-Over Two Hundred Ballots, Well Divided as to Candidates, Were Thrown Out.

It is surprising that the large number of ballots that were spoiled here at Tuesday's election, the result of ignorance on the part of electors. As all are aware it was the first time the new ballot adopted by the Dominion government was used. On each ballot was a round white space opposite the name of each candidate. Within this circle it was intended the voter should mark a cross, signifying the candidate he wished to support. It will be surprising to learn that over two hundred in this city failed to follow instructions and place their crosses in the space intended for it. Instead, they marked their ballot on the left hand side, right in front of the candidate's name. In one subdivision there were twenty-four ballots thus spoiled, in another there were fifteen, at others the number spoiled varied from seven upwards.

The printed instructions issued by the government permitted the voter to mark his ballot opposite the name of the candidate supported. If brought to the attention of the judges he was told to do so. It was pointed out that the instructions need not be followed in every case if the voter was beyond doubt, but simply because the cross was not within the white circle the ballot was rejected in each instance.

ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE.

Accident at Knitting Mill.
A Door on the Big Heater Burst and De-layed Work.

The employees at the Kingston knitting mill received a severe fright this morning about eleven o'clock, when a door on the big heater in the engine room burst, blowing off with a report like the discharge of a cannon, frightening not only the employees of the mill, but residents of the locality.

The heater has been in use about three years. It is used also as a filter to remove any impurities from the water before it is fed to the boiler. The door is about twelve feet in circumference. Three cast-iron doors, one above the other, are bolted on the heater. It was the middle one that burst. On an average there is about 112 degrees. From this the boiler is heated to 225 degrees. COULING WAS WELL FINED.

SAID HE DID NOT REMEMBER STRIKING PHILLIPS.

But the Evidence Was Quite Largely Against Him—He Grew Angry When Asked Not to Interrupt the Manager—He Was Fined \$5 or Given a Term in Jail.

Michael Kelly, charged with having been drunk, was fined \$5 and kept in the choice of going to jail for ten days, in the police court this morning.

Henry Burton, on a similar charge, was taxed to the extent of \$2 and ten days, and failing payment, will go to jail for ten days.

Montagu Couling denied all knowledge of the assault he committed yesterday on Thomas Phillips, but he admitted that he was drunk.

Phillips was present with a cut and swollen upper lip, the effect of Couling's blow. He swore that he never saw Couling to his knowledge until yesterday.

Couling succeeded him as he stood at the door of the Lake Ontario fish company's store and said he wanted three pounds of pike. Phillips went into the store to get the fish and Couling, following him went to the window of the office, where manager Wheelock was waiting. Phillips asked him not to interrupt the latter who was writing.

Couling said, "All right," but went on the other side of the window. Phillips asked not to interrupt. He said he had sold many hundred pounds of pike to Mr. Wheelock, and went out. In a few moments he returned and struck Phillips on the head with a brick. Phillips was again struck on the head with a brick. Other witnesses corroborated this testimony. Couling's wife said he has steady work, but got drunk over the election. He was sentenced to pay \$5 and ten days, or to spend one month in jail. A charge of drunkenness stands.

RETIREMENT OF DR. LAVELL.

A Difficult Task For Any Man is a Prison Wardenship.

The retirement of M. Lavell, M.D., from the wardenship of Kingston penitentiary is an event worthy of special notice in our columns. The Kingston penitentiary is the largest institution of its kind in the Dominion of Canada, having a convict number about 800, and employees numbering nearly 100; and Dr. Lavell has been at the head of this large and important institution since 1888.

Prior to that time he had been for thirteen years to the institution in the important office of surgeon.

No minister of the crown in dominion or provincial governments, no public officer in the ordinary line, has more difficult or more momentous task than that which rests on the occupant of the position held so long by the retiring warden. The uniform testimony of those who have had the best opportunities of knowing is that Dr. Lavell has always had the highest ideal and standard before him, viz., the reformation of the prisoner, and his preparation for sober, industrious and useful citizenship.

Methods for accomplishing this result have been those of kindness, confidence, employment and instruction. In the Kingston penitentiary there is every opportunity for the man who really desires to improve and reform the remainder of his life from that which has blighted it hitherto. The warden's ideals have been on the best lines, and the results in many cases have been very encouraging.

We wish for Dr. Lavell a long and enjoyable rest, and a quiet life in which they enter, and an increasing interest in the church services and social relationship which are so important a part of our life.

MIGHT HAVE BEEN DROWNED.

Foolish Wager Made With a Drunken Man Yesterday.

A tragedy might easily have occurred at Folger's wharf last evening, as a consequence of the undue influence of a drunken man to make an attempt to swim to the shoal lower from the shore. The man was so drunk that he was not fit to take care of himself; he wore heavy boots, and he was unable to keep his head above water, no matter how good a swimmer he might be. One of the men present offered to bet \$10 that the man could not swim to the tower, and in order to win the money, the stranger plunged into the water, dressed as he was in clothing and wearing the huge top-boots spoken of before. Before he had gone very far his powers began to fail and he cried out that he was sinking. A man who was longer stay in the water would have been sufficient to put the man beyond human assistance. As it was, however, while he was being drawn towards the shore, he was rescued by the water-turbines in his endeavor to keep the last vestige of self-control, a life-line was obtained and the end was thrown to him. He succeeded in catching it and was drawn safely to shore in a thoroughly exhausted condition. He soon recovered, however.
