The Inquest Brings Out Some Startling.

Facts Adjourned Till Monday. GEORGETOWN, Jan. 26 .- Not for many years has such intense interest been displayed in any court proceedings by the prople of this town and vicinity as was vesterday at the opening of the adjourned nquest of the now famous Campbell case. Long before the appointed hour for opening the inquest the hall was literally packed and Town Constable Search had great difficulty making room for the jurors. The jury, consisting of Georgetown's most worthy citizens, with Daniel Cook as foreman, then filed in and took their appointed places. Coroner Sutherland then called the first witness, Dr. Anderson, of Hamilton, sworn, said

that on the night of the 29th December he was called out to see the deceased at 25 Flight street, Hamilton, He found deceased in a very high fever. His face was in a terribly battered condition, which deceased said was caused by being thrown out of a buggy in Georgetown. Calling next day, Dr. Anderson said deceased showed symptoms of rhenmatic fever. Deceased became delirious towards night and remained in about the same condition till his death on January 3rd.
