

Interesting to Amateur Scientists. A simple but effective barometer can be a common, wide mouthed pickle bottle within three inches of the top with water then taking an ordinary Florence oil flask, and, having removed the straw covering and washed it thoroughly, plunging the neck of the flask as far as it will go into the pickle bottle, you have thus a complete barometer. In fine weather the water will rise into the neck of the flask higher than the mouth of the pickle bottle; in wet and windy weather it will fall to within an inch of the mouth of the flask.
