Toronto's Financial Budget.

TORONTO, March 24,-The estimates of the expanditure for the coming year was brought down to-day by the city treasurer. The total estimate of maintenance expenditure for the year 1894 is \$3,-243,050 against \$3,325,000 last year. This expenditure represents a taxation of sixteen and five-eighths mills. Last year it was seventeen and a quarter mills. This estimate does not include \$76,000 which the public schools asks for, for new schools, and which, if added to the amount to be raised by taxation will bring the rate to seventeen and oneeighth mills.
