OTTAWA, May 1 .- It is now generally agreed that the House will not adjourn tomorrow until Monday as was intimated. Thursday being Ascension day neither the Senate nor House will sit, and the upper chamber will stand adjourned until Monday. It is believed the tariff resolutions will be got through this week, but the fact that Thursday is a holiday will make it necessary to expedite matters on the other two government days.

In the House yesterday Sir Richard Cartwright quoted a resolution passed by the British Columbia Legislature, expressing the hope that the Imperial Parliament would not give legal effect to the Behring Sea arbitration unless the British Columbia sealers be compensated in respect to ressels which have been seized, and that British Columbia sealers be compensated for illegal exclusion from Behring Sea during the years 1891, 1893 and 1893. He asked whether a copy of the resolution was telegraphed to the Imperial Government, whether any such basis of the catch of seals as is above referred to was arrived. G.T.R. SHAREHOLDERS.

They Hold a Stormy Meeting and Discuss the Falling Off in Receipts. LONDON, May 1. - The half-yearly meeting of the Grand Trunk shareholders was held yesterday. The chairman, Sir Hanry Cyler, and the directors, on entering the room, were received with audible remarks of disapproval. Unmistakable hisses were mingled with the applause with which

their supporters greeted them. Sir Henry, on rising to move the adoption of the report, was received with applause which was swamped under a chorus of groans and hisses. He blamed the general depression experienced in both continents for the condition of affairs which the report revealed and as being the cause of the failing off in traffic recipts. He said that money would be required for the construction of the new Union station at Toronto. Mr. Hosehold, a former auditor, moved a resolution to the effect that a commission consisting of three shareholders and three directors be appointed to investigate the accounts and report therefrom upon the

condition and prospects of the branches now attrehed to the Grand Trunk system. Mr. Hosehold in his speech bitterly assailed the management, and declared that Sir Henry Tyler had wilfully hoodwinked the shareholders. He characterized the directors as a lot of dummies. Mr. Robertson referred to Lord Claude Hamilton, one of the directors, as holding a similar position in nine different companies which might account for his apathy so far as the Grand Trunk was concerned. This soft impeachment Lord Hamilton denied.

A shareholder asked Sir Henry Tyler whether the Grand Trunk maintained friendly relations with the Canadian Pacific Railway. Sir Henry replied that the management of the two railways were on the best of terms. Messrs. Van Horne, general manager of the C. P. R., and Seargeant of the G. T. R., were always in close communication.
