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

Plant Fruits. If you own a piece of land, even if it does not contain more than five acres, plant a portion of it to fruit. In a small orehard it is a good plan to alternate apple and peach trees. In this way you can plant trees much closer together, as the peach trees will have died before the apple trees are large enough to interfere with them. Don't plant apple trees closer than two rods of each other. If you do you will find you have made a mistake before they are half-grown. Plums, apricots and cherries may be planted twenty feet apart. It will be a long time before they crowd each other. Standard pears should have five feet more room each way. I don't favor planting dwarf fruit trees. They bear early and die early. This may be done in a new country where fruit is scarce. and land is cheap. It is a good plan to cultivate a young orchard. Manure well. Plant small fruits (for the first five years) between the rows, leaving it so you can plow one way, especially where the tract is small and land is dear, -Farmer's

Scurfy Bark Louse, The specimens, by a subscriber of the Orange Judd Farmer, are not eggs, says that paper, but are in reality the scales of a species of bark louse known as the Scurfy Bark Louse (Chiona pis furfurus), which is quite commonly found in orchards, affecting apple trees and various other plants including currents. This insect is quite injurious and is apt to spread amount of damage unless checked by prompt treatment. Herosene emulsion is the proper remedy and may be applied at the present time by scrubbing or spraying the affected trees to destroy the eggs beneath the scales. It will also be well to spray the trees with kerosens emulsion during the latter part of May or early in June so that if larvie have hatched from eggs which escaped the emulsion they will be killed at that time. When they are leaving the scales they are more easily destroyed than after the scales form a protection for them.

Baked Bananas, Bananas may be baked. A tablespoon f augar and a teaspoon of hot water should be allowed for each banana. The fruifshould be pared and slit in two.
