



ribute Rice and the Imperial Barns - How the Emperor Collects His Taxes-A Look at Chinatown and Some Other Big Towns -A Few Bits of Chinese Art. CHINKIANO, China-I write this letter at

Chinking, a walled city on the banks of the; Yangtse river. It is just about 150 miles from the seacoast, and is at the point where the Grand Canal crosses the Yangtee. This canal is one of the great wonders of the world. It is now in bad repair and a large part of it is going to ruin. But is has been one of the greatest waterways of the world, and it extends from Peking south to Hangehow, some 200 odd miles below this point, running through the great plain from north to middle Chine, a distance about as great as that between Montreal and Chicago. It cuts its way through a territory containing 170,000,000 people, and it taps some of the biggest cities of the world. Paking, where it finishes its course, is a city of more than 1,000,000 people. Tientsin, below this, about eighty miles, is still larger, and as it runs further south the canal is dotted with walled cities and great towns all along its course to the Yangtse River. Chinklang is about as big

as Minneapolis. Yangchow, the next big

CHINESE PROVISION-DEALER. city on the canal south of here, contains, I am told, a half a million people, and Suchan and Hangehow each have something like three-quarters of a million souls. At every thirty miles along its course it is safe to say there is a walled city, containing many times 10,000 people, and the country back of it is a garden spotted with clumps of trees, each clump abading a Chinese village. The canal at Chinkiang outs right, around the city, forming the island upon which the main part of it is located. It runs from here northward for 280 miles without a lock, but above this, I am told, there are numerous sluices and looks, and in some places the water is carried through the country on great stone embankments, twenty and more feet high, and the stream at some of these places is fully 200 feet wide. It has stone floodgates managed by soldiers, and it is here and there fed by creeks and rivers. At one point a river was conducted into it in times past, and the Chinese say that 300,-000 men were employed for seven months in turning the waters of this single stream, It cuts the Yellow Rivery and it is below this that the stone embankments above spoken of are located. 
