The following statistics of the Church of England have lately been received; The forms were issued to every beneficed elergyman in the Kingdom, and out of 13, 562, 12,875 reported. The returns show 1,607,930 Communicants; about 6,500,000 sittings in parish churches, chapels of ease, missions, etc.; 2,205,549 Sunday-school scholars and 188,011 teachers, 1,586 licensed and 2,274 unlicensed day readers, 151 paid and 107 unpaid deaconesses, 72 paid and 416 unpaid sisters, 1,127 paid and 123 unpaid nurses, 803 paid and 165 unpaid mission women. Of the sittings in the parish churches 3,925,944, or three-fourths of the whole, are free, the remainder being appropriated. The net income of the beneficed clergy is given as \$16,429,955. The average net income of the parochial clergy is a little over \$1,200. The total of voluntary contributions amounted to \$27,






