William Hawker, workman in Carnovsky cabinet-making establishment, had a very narrow escape from being killed this morning. One of the belts flew off the wheel and in putting it on again he became caught in the set screw at the end of the shaft. The machinery was in full motion and it was a wonder how he escaped with his life. His clothes were caught at the shoulder and literally torn from his body. When the engine had been stopped and the men arrived on the scene he was stark naked except for wrist bands that had been on his arms.
