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





Diphtheria, 2 to 7 days, oftenest 2; typhoid fever, 8 to 14 days, sometimes 23; influenza, I to 4 days, oftenest 3 to 4; measles, 7 to 18 days, oftenest 14; mumps, 2 to 3 weeks, oftenest 3 weeks; rubcola, 2 to 3 weeks; scarlet fever, 1 to 7 days, oftenest 2 to 4; smallpox, 9 to 15 days, oftenest 12.
