YANKEE GAS MEN ALARMED largest majority ever given a Conservative | Canadian Companies Are Proving Formid-

able Rivals to Americans. WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 .- The importation of natural gas from Canada into the United States is assuming such proportions on the northern frontier as to call serious attention to the rivalry thus occasioned between Canadian companies and companies supplying cities with illuminating gas from wells in the United States. The Treasury Department, when appealed to protect American gas in the case of a Canadian company which brought natural gas into Buffalo by means of a pipe line, at first placed a duty of 20 per cent. ad valorem upon it as a mineral product. Subsequently this duty was, by decision, reduced to 10 per cent. ad valorem, and the latest ruling on the subject by the Treasury Department is that the Canadian gas is free as an enumerated unmanufactured article.
