

Killed by a Wrecked Train, TOMAHAWK, Wis., Oct. 9.-Train wreckers sawed the supporting timbers of the Soo road bridge at Tomahawk Junction and the engine of an early west bound passenger train went through the structure. Four Wrecked Passengers Missing, STORET, N.S.W., Oct. 9.-The steamer Londondo, from Adelaide for Fremantie went on Pollock Reef, off the West Australian coast, on October 6. Of the 164 passengers all but four made their way on boats and rafts to the southeast of the island. Thirty-six-members of the crew were saved also. The four missing passengers are supposed to have been drowned.

The Cyclone Reaches Florida. JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 9.—The cyclone reported raging in the Gulf near Galveston, Texas, has reached Florida. At noon the wind at Pensacola was reported to be blowing at a velocity of 64 miles an hour. Shortly after that the wires went down between this place and Pensacola and it is impossible to learn whether any damage has been done.
