Peixoto Will Gives His Support to the New President, Moraes. WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.-Minister Mendonca denies emphatically the report from Rio Janeiro that President Peixoto proposes setting himself up as a dictator of the republic and will for that reason refuse to surrender the reins of office into the hands of the newly-elected president. Senor Moraes, on the 15th inst.

If President Pexioto, Senor Mendones says, has any intention of playing the role of dictator he would not have consented to the election and would not have raised the states of siege throughout the republic, in order that every citizen might have a chance to cast a hallot. Moreover, the arrangements for the festivities in connection with Moraes' induction into the presidency are now in course of preparation and the new Minister will be formally inaugurated one week from to-day. > AWFUL ELEVATOR ACCIDENT. A Young Woman Dies in a Terrible Man-

ner-A Sickening Sight. NEW YORK, Nov. 8 .- Katie Gillespie, oung saleswoman in the store of Hulton, Hughes & Co., was killed in a passenger elevator in that building. She had just entered the elevator to ascend to the fourth floor. The gar was so crowded that it would not move, and she was requested to step out and take another one. As she was stepping from the car one of the passengers pushed against the elevator boy, who was leaning on the lever, and the weight caused him to lose his balance and push the lever to one side.

The car darted downward, and catching Miss Gillespie's head between the iron floor piece and the top of the elevator door. Her head had by its obstruction stopped the rapidly descending car and was almost torn from the body. The body hung with the blood flowing in streams down her clothing to the floor.
