CHRISTLEY'S CONFESSION.

HE DID GET MONEY FROM JOHN LAIRD.

And He Also Got a Receipt Bill During the Last Aldermanic Campaign--That Witnesses Relate That Christley Them--Reading the Trial.

N the election trial last evening the evidence, reported on page two, caused a sensation among the electors, and it was the interest in the investigation.
