A SOCIAL REVOLUTION. Probably the most important bi brought before the Ontario legislature is that providing for the prevention of cruelty to and better protection of children. The act provides for the infliction of a fine or imprisonment or both on any person over sixteen years of age who having charge of a boy under fourteen LA BIBBY, 100 BROCK STREET, THE years of age or a girl under sixteen, willfully ill-treats, neglects, abandons, sauses suffering to such child. As long a sentence as nine months' imprisonment can be inflicted at the option of the

Persons causing children under the ages named to beg, whether by pretending to sing, perform, or by offering anything for sale, or to sing or to play in taverns between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m., or to perform in public places when under ten years of age, are subjected to similar severe penalties. The municipal authorities may, however, change the hours, and may grant license to children over seven years of age to perform in circus and other entertainments, and the municipal officers are smpowered to see that the provisions of the licenses are observed.

Where a person is convicted of illtreating a child, or of causing a child to contravene the law, anyone can bringthe child before a judge, who, if satisfied that it is so expedient, may order the child to be taken out of the custody of the offender and placed in the hands of a relative until, if a boy, he attains the age of fourteen, and if a girl the age of sixteen, provided that a parent of the child is privy to the offence charged.

Any person or society to whom the shild is so committed shall practically have parental control over the child, and any judge can order the parent of the child to contribute to its support. That there may be no injustice done to anyone, the lieutenant-governor-in-council is empowered at any time to discharge a child from custody, or to alter or revoke the regulations relating to these children.

A most important new departure is the provision for the appointment of a superintendent of neglected and dependent children, whose salary shall be voted by the legislature. His duty will be to encourage and assist the organization of children's aid societies for the protection of children from cruelty, and for the due care of neglected and dependent children in temporary homes or shelters and the | S.
