

THE KINDERGARTEN WORK

TRUSTEES THINK MUCH MORE
TIME MUST BE DEVOTED.

The Business Before the Trustees—The Spe-
cial Meeting Last Night.—The Kinder-
garten Classes are Very Longingly Attend-
ed—Taking Over the Work.

A special meeting of the school board

had last evening. Present A. Shaw,

chairman; Messrs. Anglin, Bennett,
Chown, Donnelly, Elliott, Lambert, Mar-
tin, Wilson, Mr. Fee.

COMMUNICATED READ.

From W. May, superintendent of art
schools and mechanics' institutes, asking
for cost of each building, name of each
principal, number of assistant teachers,
number of pupils boys and girls. This
was referred to the committee of

trustees for consideration.

From J. P. Ferri, offering to supply

for lawn parties. Referred to the com-
mittee on school property committee.

From Mary A. Cunningham, and

Georgia Hilton, asking for positions on

the teaching staff. Referred to the com-
mittee on school management.

Mr. Donnelly presented the report of

the finance committee, recommending

the payment of the following accounts:

Dr. Ferri said he had been asked for

the cost of furniture for Victoria school

but pointed out that the city contractor

built the school at city prices and it was

considered satisfactory for its purchase.

Moved by Mr. Lambert, seconded by

Mr. Donnelly, that the school property

committee investigate whether there is

an unusual amount of sickness among

scholars and teachers, and suggested

occupying the basement of the Central

school; what is the probable cause and

how can the evil be remedied. Carried.

The board adjourned at 10:30 o'clock.
