Delegate Standish of the N.A.A.O. turns-The sport in Paris. DETROIT, May 20 .- Fred D. Standish, the well-known oarsman, has returned from a trip to England and France, where he went some weeks ago to tender the crews an invitation from Detroit for the International regatta to be held here this sainmer. He found rowing on the boom in England and was surprised to see so many interested in the colleges and universities,

The Oxford crew, for instance, is nade up of the pick of the 23 college crews in the university, and one afternoon Mr. Standish saw all the crews training, each one having an expert coach on horseback, followed the substitutes running behind him. principal mission was to explain to the oreign crews just what Detroit proposed to do and what the National Association Amateur Oarsmen is. He was royally entertained by all the crews, and 'the feeling is very favorable

"Of course it is too early to say whether any of the crews will accept the invitaon," said Mr. Standish. "The university eights have disbanded and the members are rowing in the college crews preparatory to the association races, which will be held shortly. Just before I arrived in London there was a regatta of what is known as scratch eights be onging to the West End Amateur Rowing Association, and 15 crews took part. The course was truly English and described on the bill as from the Cor crete Steps to the Soap Works. It is sur prising the number of men engaged in row ing in England in amateur circles, and the interest is, I believe, more keen than in any

"In Paris I found that there has been a lew organization of amateurs in the last half year, and the society now includes 9; clubs with 8000 members. The trouble with rowing in France was that cash prizes were given, and almost every parsman in the country became a professional. Their new rules, which do away with this feature, are very similar to ours, and I have a letter from the secretary of the general society asking the N.A.A.O. to make a proposition to the French association similar to the one under which the French and English associations are working-that is that when we row in France we row under French rules and when in England under, English rules, their crews rowing under our rules when they come here. According to the English definition, a man who is a mechanic cannot be an amateur, but in France, as in this country, no such provision exists. When the London crows row in France they have to meet any amateurs the French society vouches for, but when the French crews go to London the mon must be amateurs under the English definition. The Executive Board will hold a special meeting shortly to take action on the proposi-

tion, which strikes me as being very fair. "The principal things standing in the way of English and French crews coming over are the matters of expense and vacations. The men would have to be away for several weeks and the expense would be heavy; still, the leading oarsmen of the clubs took very kindly to the suggestions made by me and assured me that if America is visited this year it will be to row at


