

to pay it." The custom of making particular vows to God is a very ancien one. The earliest of such vows is that perplexity, of severe affliction, that we should make rows unto God if he would a relation to Him, that ho extra vows could be made, because we faithfull performed all our own duties. But since such a condition is rarely found God does not dislike our vows, but He does demand of us that when made yows should be faithfully paid. He does not make it obligatory upon us to make vows, but He does oblige us to fulfill them. If we are in trouble or distress. He does not require us to vow a vow if He delivers us, but He expects us to keep it if we do. Too many vows are not paid. This is highly displeasing to God. It is a sin against Him. Therefore when we

2. Vows to man. Col. iii, 23-24, "Servants, obey in all things your masters." This is the principle of vows between man and man. Payment is the thing required. It is the same as between man and God. We are not required to make obligations to our fellow men, but if we be sacredly guarded and fulfilled. one is obliged to accept office under his 239 PRINCESS STREET.
