RAILROAD ACCIDENTS.

Seven Injured By a Collision-Twenty-Five Cars and Two Locomotives Smashed. ROCHESTER, June 26 .- Two extra freight trains westbound collided about half a mile west of Corfu on the Central road at 12.30 o'clock yesterday.
