



About two months and a half before a great race I begin to roll tenpins. Then I take in each hand a teopin ball weighing 18 pounds and throw it over my head 600 or 700 times in 40 minutes, making about 10,000 or 12,000 pounds weight. In addi-tion to this exercise I walk about 20 miles a day. I pursue this course of exercise about two months before the rowing exercise. I row from 15 to 20 miles a day, dividing the work between morning and afternoon. I row pretty strong and generally take off two or three pounds at the beginning of my work. I never have to take off more than 20 pounds. I have been training for about 17 years, and my was, and this I attribute to the good care I

When I commence training, I go at easy, every day gradually adding to my



work, exercising a little harder each day up to near the day of the race, when I ease

up on my work. I have no particular rules about eating. I sat good wholesome food and drink a little Bass ale every day, taking it after In fact, it would not be possible for a woeach rowing exercise. Some men can do without a beverage, but I work hard and believe I should have something to sweat out; besides ale is strengthening. I drink, tea three times a day. My theory about training is very simple: A man should have plenty to eat, plenty of sleep, and then he will be able to do plenty of work. A man should not stint himself in eating

I am saked what is the proper position in rowing. The answer is that a man should sit naturally in the boat-sit as he would at his dinner table. Sit with your legs not close together or spread out, but about 10 inches apart. When I reach forward with my arms in the return stroke, my knees come up under my armpits. By spreading your legs sufficiently apart you do not cramp your stomach. If you sit unnaturally with your legs too close together you squeeze your stomach. To reach too far out is not natural. The theory of rowing is to bring everything in line. Put the oar in the water naturally, but put it in hard with the idea that it must do some good. The stroke consists of a quick forward movement, a very slow recovery and a hard finish. Where speed is got out of this Yale stroke is not by throwing the body forward, but the arms and feet forward, the body being brought up slowly; in that way the body can keep up with any stroke. But this method would not do for singlescull rowing, because the body motion forward is a little too slow. Nor would it be good for four-oared racing, but for eightcared racing I think it is the best system

The fin is another neeful contrivance. The fin is a piece of steel about aix inches long by three inches deep. It is placed in the bottom of the boat and steadies it in the water. The fin boars the same relation to a row boat that a center-board does to a sail boat. The advantage gained in time by the use of this contrivance is about

The use of the curved oars is also a great improvement, the advantage being in the catch rather than at the finish! The dvantage in time over straight oars is about a minute in three miles or a distance

The shortest races are the hardest ones to row because both men buckle right lown to work at the outset and keep at it in hammer and tongs fashion up to the finish. You have no time to get into any particular form or carry out any theories you have in regard to rowing. You must reep right at your work and get ahead as fast as possible. In a long race it dosen't make so much difference whether . you are half a length, or two lengths behind your pponent, because you will have a chance to make it up. I always row a quarter of a mile race at a quicker rate of speed than a five-mile race. I have won 50 five-mile races and they have been the casiest contests in which I have engaged.

I have been saked if I reserve my forces for the finish. You will not think about reserving force if you find the other man right alongside of you in a race. As I have already said the hardest work is nearly always done at the beginning of the race, and even when your opponent is alongside of you it is not always advisable to make an extra exertion to beat him, unless you are near the finish; for often-times you only exhaust your strength in the middle of the contest.

Of all exercises I think rowing is the best. It is good for women, but in practicing it they must not wear corsets; they should wear a loose dress. When people go to watering places it is surprising that they do not take advantage of the opportunities afforded for rowing. Instead of sitting around on the plazzas of the hotel they should get in a boat and row.

Though I think rowing is an excellent exercise for woman, I do not approve of their taking part in any racing confests. were proper for them to engage in such

Young men, amsteur carsmen, often hart themselves in rowing in this way: They will row in an eight or four oared boat or a double scull. They have been used to a sedentary and inactive life all the winter. One man in the boat, however, is practice all the winter. They generally make him the "stroke oar." There are many instances of young men being injured in that way. 



After death not one single part of the anineal is wasted. The flesh forms a staple article of food the blood is used by sugar refiners and for various commercial purposes, the hair scraped from the hide is mixed with plaster to make it adhere more firmly to the walls and ceilings of rooms, while the hide itself is tanned into leather. The solid tips of the horns are used for knife handles and buttons, and the other portions for combs, spoons, drinking cups, shoe lifts, etc. The shin and buttock bones make good handles for table knives and forks, toothbrushes, etc. Other of the bones are distilled in large retorts for the manufacture of sal ammoniac. The bone ash left after this manufacture is used by sugar refiners to take the color out of the sirup and so produce white sugar. From the hoofs and waste parts of the horns glue is made. The entrails, after being properly cleaned, are used as casings for sausages, while the contents of the stomach and the refuse from the bones are utilized in the manufacture of artificial manures.
