RECOVERY OF THE COLLIERY FIC-TIMS PROCEEDS SLOWLY.

Eighty-Eight Bodies Have Been Brought to the Surface-Iwo Men Rescued Unconscious But Alive-The Bodies to the Mine Are Pinnel Down by Debris.

Lospon, July 6 .- The latest news from the Ingram Colliery in Yorkshire, in which an explosion occurred yesterday, shows that 110 men probably parished. The work of rescuing the living miners and recovering the bodies of the dead is

being pushed as rapidly as possible in Ingram's golliery. Voinnteers for the work of rescue are plenty and the miners are working their way into the furthermost workings of the pit as expeditiously as can be 'expected in view of the fact that they have to remove enormous quantities of debris from the gal-

Little progress was made last night, as the inner workings were still full of gas, and the rescuing purty could get only a little distance from the shaft. Bodies can be seen in different parts of the mine, but they are pinned down with rocks and timbers, and it will take some ime to remove them.

show a sign of how death was caused. There men escaped the effects, of the explosion, but were killed by the choke-damp that filled the mine.

Late this evening the rescuera had brought 88 bodies to the surface. Two men were brought up unconscious, but still breathing. Sx men who had sustained no injuries w atever but had been imprisoned behind a huge mase of debris ware

Eight men and a boy have been rescued from the mine. All hope for the others in the pit has been abandoned: The bodies of the victims are being rapidly brought to the surface.
