GIVE US MORE THOUSANDS. THIS IS THE REQUEST OF THE CITY COUNCIL. So that the Sydney Street Extension From Princess to Johnston Street Can be Carried out the Vote Will Be Taken at an Early Date.

The finance committee, in its report to the council, expressed the opinion that the large expense already incurred in submitting the by-law for the opening of Sydney Street to the electors and in carrying on the arbitration so far completed, and which amounts to a sum in the neighborhood of \$4,000 or more, is too great to warrant the committee in dropping the matter without again submitting the question to the citizens for settlement. The committee recommended that a supplementary vote of \$15,000 be asked from the ratepayers for the purpose of completing the work on the lines laid down under the existing by-law, and that the vote be taken at the same time and place as the municipal elections in January next.

The statement was published giving the amounts of the several awards to be rendered and the costs connected, as well as an estimate of the value of the properties yet to be adjudicated upon and the probable costs thereof should the matter proceed to arbitration. These made a grand total of \$15,000 but as this may be exceeded the committee advised that a 10 per cent. margin be inserted in the by-law.

It is true that by diverting the line of street to the east so as to avoid the property of the Hon. J. H. McKeivry, the matter might perhaps be put through at a cost of about \$10,000 less, but owing to the importance of the thoroughfare and the certain reaction it would occasion, the committee is of the opinion that the lines provided under the by-law should be retained.

Ald. Meek asked if it was legal to submit a by-law at the time of the municipal elections. The city solicitor had stated that a bonus by-law for a public utility could be submitted to the electors at the time of the elections. Ald. W. Robinson rose to speak and the mayor did not hear him. He was engaged in talking to another alderman. Ald. Bowes - "You are asking me to give you my money. You do not pay your duty Mr. Mayor. You do not pay your duty to the council."

Ald. W. Robinson said he was of the opinion he held at the present time, and the scheme to extend Sydney street. The work would cost \$50,000, and the improvement was not necessary. Ald. Bowes said that the opening of the street would be no good at all. Ald. W. Robinson - "You are right this time Ald. Bowes. The arbitrators and witnesses in the arbitration should give the council the amounts they have charged for time."

Ald. Skinner said the opening of the street was not necessary. He would meet the approval of the citizens. Ald. Bowes said that in the light of the present financial condition of the city he was not advocating anything of the kind. Ald. Meek urged that the new by-law should be submitted to the people as early as possible, and if the council would amend the report in this matter he would vote for it.

Ald. McIntyre thought it very desirable to have the supplementary by-law submitted at a time when it would be well met. At the time of the municipal elections would be good time. In consequence of the sparse vote for the by-law there was a great deal of complaining. Ald. Meek asked, seconded by Ald. Skinner, "That a by-law be submitted to the ratepayers as soon as possible to raise a way of loan to the extent of \$15,000 for the opening of Sydney street and that the report be so amended."

Ald. Meek said his opinion was the by-law would be voted down, but it was desirable that the council should get rid of the matter. The speaker said he was not advocating anything of the kind, but he would vote for it at the next municipal elections, because he would not be a candidate. Ald. Meek said he was in favor of taking the sense of the people with regard to the extension of Sydney street as soon as possible. The amendment was carried.
