CUTTING DOWN THE PAY

The Clerks Have To Stand A Cut-The Promised Amalgamation, OTTAWA, July 12,-The enforcement of the civil service act is telling rather hard on the extra clerks in some of the departments. The act does not allow extra clerks to be employed at a higher salary than the minimum of a third-class clerk-\$400 per annum. Many of the extras were receiving \$2 or \$3 a day. but the auditor-general has insisted upon a strict compliance with the law. and some severe drops have taken place; amongst them ten clerks in the geological survey, who were getting \$60 per

month, have been reduced to \$400 a year. and they are not greatly pleased thereat. It is said that notice will shortly be given of an application to parliament for an act to amalgamate the Canada Atlantie, Ottawa, Arnprior and Parry Sound, St. Lawrence and Adirondack and Parry sound colonization railway companies. This will make about 500 miles of railway, constructed and under construction,

under one management. Ordered To Remove Their Exhibit, CERCAGO, July 12 .- Chief Allen, of the manufacturers' building, has ordered Robert H. Ingersoll & Bro., New York exhibitors of novelties, to remove their display from the building.

The New York firm was found to be selling their goods, now on exhibition, for immediate delivery, in direct violation of a recent order by director-general Davis, which says that all goods on display must remain as part of the exhibit until the close of the fair, sales being permitted only on condition that the de ivery shall not be made until after Nov.

Both foreign and American exhibitors are attempting to secure a modification of this order, permitting them to sell suplicates of their exhibits, and have ad dressed a communication to that effect to Col. Davis. It is hardly probable he will

grant the concession.
