from a sympathetic observer's experi-I have, for example, witnessed something of life in the backwoods. Seated on an inverted pail, with my back against the log wall of the dwelling and with smoking embers at my feet to keep husband and wife working side by side (not an uncommon thing in the bush) amid charred logs, branches and which levelled the forest The task of these toilers was to collect all those remains into heaps, by means of oxen and manual labor, and to reduce them to ashes, and so clear the land. The man was attired for his work in shirt, trousers and high boots, but the woman's clothing was totally unsuitable. Blackened and torn, catching here and catching there, getting under her feet and otherwise impeding her freedom of movement, her petticoats were a positive hindrance and distress to her. Another thought then occurred to me, that if custom would permit women, when they had to do such work, the liberty of wearing some slight feminine-modification of man's attire, what a real boon it would be to them. The relief may be imagined by fancying the wretchedness a man would feel at his labor, cooped up in skirts. I have stood on a bridge-not at mid-

night, but about mid-day-and seen the banks of the river lined with women washing clothes in the flowing stream. They were bare-legged, their petticoats were gathered up and tucked between their knees, and hold there as tightly as escaping and falling into the water as their owners stooped and moved their limbs. 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
