

Toric.-God's great command. Acts zvil, 80: The Bible contains many divine commands. There is the greatest commandment, "Thou shalt love the Lord, thy God," and the next greatest, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." Within these greatest commands are many In Heliothrope. smaller, but by no means fasignificant enes. The one before us is the command to repent. God "now commandeth all men everywhere to repent." Con-

1. What is the great commund (Acts xvii, 20/2 It is as just stated, the command to universal repentance. Paul is preaching on Mars hill, Athens. He tells the cultured Greeks that in times past God had passed over their ignorance, but now commanded them to repent. But what is repentance? It embraces two ideas-a turning from sin, a turning to God. Neither is true repentance. A man may reform for personal advantage, God not considered. This is not repentance. One may in a sense turn toward God, yet not turn from his sin. Neither is this true repentance. There must be both stepsfrom sin, toward God. "Let the wicked forsake his way and the unrighteous man his thoughts, and let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon htm" (Iss. lv, 7).

2. To whom is the great command given (Luke xiii, 1-5)? It is unional. It is to all men everywhere, from the cultured and learned Greek to the rude and uncouth savage. It is to the moral Pharisee as well as to the one who has most often and most heinously sinned against God. All who have sinued must repent if they are saved. All have sinned, and therefore it is necessary for all to repent if they are saved. The Greeks thought repentance beneath them. The pharisaical Jews thought they needed no repentance, but Christ Himself said to them, "Except ye repent ye shall perish," as did the Galileans and those upon whom the tower of Siloam fell. The command is to each one of us, and therefore each should in-

3. The time for repentance (Acts xvii, 30). The time is the present-new. This life is the only time given us for repentance. There is no repentance in the future, no repentance in hell. Man may curse and blaspheme God in the place of the lost, but cannot truly repent. Faith and hope are necessary to repentance, but these are gone forever in the life to come. How necessary, then, that we shall obey this great command now and repent of our sins, believe in Christ and

Christianity In China. How much the profession of faith in Christ cost in China may be inferred from the following proclamation, which has been issued in the province of Honan: "Should any one become bewitched by the foreign doctrines and not be willing to sacrifice either to Confucius or to the spirits of his ancestors, he must be severely dealt with by his clan. His name must be erased from the family register and his whole family driven from the province,"

In face of these threats several men from the province have recently become Christians. When it was known that one of these was baptized, his friends were furious. He was dragged out to the ancestral temple, where he was beaten. He was not allowed to say anything in his defense, but was made to renounce forever all clan rights and privileges. To be an outcast from one's friends and home, rather than give up one's belief, would be anywhere a severe test of sincerity, especially so in China, where so much is made of family festivals, and where so much property, such as wells, ground, animals and agricultural implements, is held in common.-Exchange.
