COLONEL SMITH'S ACTION.

HIS DISMISSAL OF A COMPANY OF
HIS MEN MAY CAUSE TROUBLE.

The Regulations Provide for a Proper In-
vestigation. A Similar Case in Which Gen-
eral Laud Dealt Severely With the Of-
fending Officer--An Order of General
Herbert's Disobeyed.

The Toronto "News" says there is con-
siderable talk in Ottawa over the action of Lt. Col.
John Smith, 14th batt., Kingston, dismissed
one of his companies for refusing to re-
turn with the battalion after their visit to
Montreal. Rules and regulations for
military men, Canada, paragraph 24,
say: "No militia man who has en-
rolled for service in the army is to be dis-
missed therefrom for irregular conduct,
unless after due investigation as provided
by law and approved from headquar-
ters."

There is much speculation as to what
the outcome of Col. Smith's action in
a court of inquiry will be.

In 1890 Lieut. Hunter, of the New
Brunswick engineers, during the absence of
Major Perley, dismissed one of his men,
Gen. Luard interfered, and as a result
the man was reinstated in Chicago the other day.
Smith dismissed the general, the
giving the ground that the officer had no
power to dismiss him without a board of enquiry.

As far as I am concerned with the
matter, I am anxious to hear what Gen.
Herbert will have to say when he re-
turns and finds the order under which Col.
McDonald, brigade major; Capt. Strange,
"A" battery, 1st Guards, and other offi-
cers of the permanent corps were to be
decapitated, has been torn up and the of-
ficers told they might remain.

The Kingston End of It.

Lieut. Col. Smith is not much agitated
over the affair. He went to Ottawa,
consulted with the military authorities,
and his order was the result of his en-
quiry there. He wanted to let the men
down as lightly as possible, and the dis-
missal was the easiest course open. An
investigation might have made matters
harder for the lads.
