of \$2,784 has been shown in the

two of the professors who were to

have received \$750 each had been forced

to put up with \$500.

A special meeting of the university

senate has been called to consider the

matter; the meeting will be asked to

authorize a draft on the surplus of \$7,

000, now in the hands of the trustees,

in order to meet the deficit.
